Characteristics and functions

In the early 1960s Kodak presented a cartridge film called "Kodapak".

The "INSTAMATIC 50" is Kodak's first camera that uses the new Kodapak 126 films. This film provides images of 28x28mm.

The Kodapak 126 was available as a color negative film (Kodakolor-X), a color slide film (Kodachrome-x and Ektachrome-X) and a negative B/W film (Verichrome Pan).

The Kodak Instamatic 50 was marketed in Great Britain in 1963 a few weeks before the presentation of the Instamatic 100 in the United States.

The camera has a 43mm focal length meniscus lens.

The diaphragm is fixed (f / 11). There are two shutter speeds:

1/40 "- when the front selector is positioned at the bottom (hazy sun or flash).

1/90 "- when the front selector is positioned at the top (full sun).

On the top cap is the flash socket for a dedicated flash, sold separately.
